SHORT-TERM GOALS 2025-2026

- Conduct a research study on the efficacy of the School Leadership Programme in the state.
- Develop and implement a monitoring framework for leadership development.
- Organize state-level leadership conclaves for knowledgesharing.
- Organise targeted training for female school leaders

STRAND 1: CONTENT AND MATERIAL DEVELOPMENT

- Develop structured training modules aligned with school leadership needs.
- Create case studies of successful leadership interventions that address diverse learning needs. The State's rank in FLN indicates that the foundation for lifelong learning and equitable education for all children. Our case studies and video documentaries will reflect that.
- Digitalize training content for online accessibility and make them available in remote areas
- Develop multilingual (English and Bengali) leadership resources for inclusive access.
- Publish research-based policy briefs for stakeholders.

STRAND 2: CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT

- Conduct state-wide leadership training programs for all school heads with more than 3 years of service period left
- Strengthen mentoring and coaching frameworks for school heads.
- Design certification programs for school leadership.
- Organize targeted training for female school leaders
- Establish a School Leadership Fellowship program.

STRAND 3: NETWORKING AND INSTITUTIONAL BUILDING

- Foster collaborations between government, academia, and NGOs.
- Establish leadership hubs in districts for peer learning.
- Organize annual leadership summits for best practice exchange.
- Create an online professional network for school leaders.

STRAND 4: RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

- Conduct longitudinal studies on the impact of leadership training.
- Establish a state-level research consortium on educational leadership.
- Develop frameworks for evidence-based policy recommendations.
- Publish annual reports on leadership development trends.
- Promote action research initiatives by school heads.
